About an hour north of Missouri's busiest highway, another east-to-west road ambles through small towns and rolling farmland, offering you time to explore and appreciate the area's natural beauty and some of the Show-Me State's greatest innovators and innovations.

Welcome to Missouri's stretch of Highway 36, or, as we like to call it, "The Way of American Genius." The nickname isn't a boast (though we concede it might be a humble brag) so much as it is acknowledgement of the great Missourians – and their contributions to the world – who once called the area home.

Mark Twain. Walt Disney. The guys who invented sliced bread. The home of the Pony Express. They all have ties to this stretch of four-lane road in northern Missouri, where the finger waved at you by fellow drivers isn't an insult, but a friendly acknowledgement of your passing through.

Whether your path moves from east to west or west to east, take time to get off of it and explore the entire Highway 36 corridor, which extends 36 miles to the north and 36 miles to the south of the actual highway.

You'll learn more about renowned Missouri physicians

whose work improved the lives of others, military leaders whose successes are unparalleled, entrepreneurs who built retail empires, tech-savvy folks who opened lines of communication in rural areas, and so much more.

While your attention may shift to the past, don't overlook the present as you travel along The Way of American Genius.

Beautiful parks, lakes, streams and conservation areas dot the landscape of the Highway 36 corridor, welcoming folks who appreciate Mother Nature and all she has to offer.



EAST 36

The roaring waters of the Mississippi River in Hannibal mark the beginning of your westward passage on Missouri Highway 36 as you enter the Show-Me State.

Known as the hometown of Mark Twain, one of the featured figures along The Way of American Genius, Hannibal boasts several attractions connected to the author's life.

The Mark Twain Boyhood Home and Museum, for example, includes the Clemens home (Twain's birth name was Samuel L. Clemens), along with the Becky Thatcher House – the family home of the girl who inspired Tom Sawyer's fictional love interest.

Elsewhere around the city, enjoy a tour of Mark Twain Cave, the home where The Unsinkable Molly Brown grew up and vintage toy trains on display at Big River Train Town and Museum.



GENIUSES:





After learning about the city's history, connect with local artists and artisans in downtown shops, grab lunch or dinner, indulge on a chocolate-sampling spree, or simply relax with a cold drink crafted by local brewmasters.

As you travel along the Highway 36 corridor (36 miles both north and south of the actual highway) you'll find several opportunities for off-the-beaten path exploration.

South of Hannibal, and also on the banks of the Mississippi, you find stops such as the Louisiana Area Historical Museum in Louisiana. To the west you'll have a chance to fish, splash or boat on Mark Twain Lake, near the communities of Florida, Perry and Monroe City. A drive in the countryside is always enjoyable and leads through farmland and places like the Heartland

Dairies in LaBelle.

One of the northernmost cities

along this section of the Highway 36 corridor is Kirksville, home of Dr. A.T. Still. Learn more about his life and contributions to medicine at the A.T. Still National Osteopathic Museum on the campus of Truman State University.

For more local history and a sampling of the arts, visit the Adair County Historical Society Museum and the Kirksville Arts Center.

Along with Dr. Still, Kirksville is well known among outdoors enthusiasts for its great hunting opportunities. Also, Kirksville has one of the region's outdoor gems, Thousand Hills State Park. Popular among hikers and cyclists, Thousand Hills has recreational opportunities on Forest Lake, plus a campground and cabins.

About 30 minutes south of Kirksville, in Macon, more opportunities for outdoor fun are found at Long Branch State Park. Inside the park is the popular Long Branch Lake, which has a



swimming beach and some of the area's best bass fishing. Camping and hiking are other popular activities at the park.

Macon is a great place to take in a live performance, too, thanks to Maples Repertory Theatre. Shows are staged in the renovated, circa 1889 Royal Theatre from June-December and include everything from fullscale productions to cabaret concerts. For a real taste of Macon, visit West Winery, where you sip a variety of grape and fruit wines in a casual atmosphere.

Macon is a hub of activity for those interested in all things related to trains. Just north of Macon, in La Plata, the Amtrak History Exhibition and Gallery is found inside two Amtrak train baggage cars adjacent to the Depot Inn and Suites. South of Macon, in Moberly, the Railroad Museum has loads of






information on railroad history and an original caboose. And at Rothwell Park, jump on the Magic City Line for a mini train ride.

Also in Rothwell Park, stop for a selfie with the statue of Gen. Omar N. Bradley, a hometown hero and American military genius who grew up in Randolph County and graduated from Moberly High School.





HIGHWAY 36 INNOVATOR

"THE SOLDIER'S GENERAL"



Only two people in the history of the United States military outrank Missouri-born Gen. Omar N. Bradley. One of them is George Washington. Yes, *that* George Washington.

Born in tiny Clark, Mo., in 1893, Bradley moved to Moberly as a teenager and later attended the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. At West Point, Bradley ranked 44th in his class of 164 (a class that included future President Dwight D. Eisenhower) and then spent the early part of his military career teaching and training troops.

In 1940, Bradley commanded the Infantry School in Fort Benning, Georgia. After U.S. forces suffered a defeat in North Africa in 1943, then Gen. Eisenhower sent for Bradley, who led a victory over German forces.

After next leading the U.S. to a successful invasion of Sicily,

General Omar N. Bradley

Bradley was tasked with one of the most significant missions of the entire war: the Invasion of Normandy. He led troops on D-Day (June 6, 1944) when Allied forces moved against the German army in France. In less than a year, forces commanded by Bradley controlled much of Germany. Before the war ended in May 1945, Bradley held the distinction of serving as field commander of the largest American force in history.

In 1949, Bradley was named the first-ever Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and by 1950 was appointed by Congress as General of the Army with five stars.

In all of history, that rank is only exceeded by the nation's first president and, strangely enough, another prominent military leader from Missouri, Gen. John J. Pershing.





experiences in Hannibal and created two of the most notable characters in American literature, Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn. The fictional town of St. Petersburg stood in for Hannibal in "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer," and "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn."

In addition to his career as an author, Twain traveled the world as a sought-after speaker, even though he was often dogged by financial woes. A man of many talents, Twain held three patents; one for an adjustable strap for shirts and undergarments, one for a self-pasting scrapbook, and one for a trivia game.


Anytime there's a discussion about famous Missourians, Mark Twain is a highlight of the conversation.

Born in Florida, Mo., as Samuel Clemens, the future author moved to Hannibal as a boy and was taken with its people and the setting. He loved life in the Mississippi River town, and he loved the river itself.

As a young man, Clemens moved to St. Louis and worked the Mississippi as a riverboat pilot. He later developed his pen name – Mark Twain – from a river term meaning two fathoms, or 12 feet, which allowed for a vessel's safe passage.

As a writer, Twain drew from his

Genius Spotlight Andrew Taylor Still

Let us not be governed today by what we did yesterday, nor tomorrow by what we do today, for day by day we must show progress.

Dr. Andrew Taylor Still, the founder of osteopathic medicine, is Kirksville's genius on Missouri Highway 36.

Developed by Still in 1874, osteopathic medicine is a unique and innovative form of medicine promoting the interconnectedness of the body, mind, and spirit. Still's osteopathic principles state each individual part of the body works together to create a healthy, functioning whole.

Still had many grim experiences as a hospital steward while serving in the 9th Kansas Cavalry for the Union Army during the Civil War; he returned and faced yet another grave personal crisis, as an epidemic

of spinal meningitis killed three of his children, and he had

already lost his first wife who died during childbirth. Still became discouraged with traditional medicine and sought a new way to heal. A practitioner believing in the body-mind-spirit philosophy, he founded the American School of Osteopathy in 1892.

By 1895 more than 30,000 osteopathic treatments were given at the infirmary in Kirksville. The Wabash Railroad increased to four the number of daily

passenger trains to Kirksville because so many people came to Kirksville seeking osteopathic treatment.

A true genius, Still also dabbled with inventions and in the 1870s, he patented an improved butter churn. Later inventions focused on medicine. Among them was the patient brace, designed to keep patients from falling off the narrow treatment table.

Still saw patients and remained active in the American School of Osteopathy almost until his death at age 89 in 1917; the beloved "Old Doctor" is remembered for changing the healing profession substantially.

Today, there are more than 70,000 osteopaths worldwide, and there are 30 accredited osteopathic colleges in the U.S.

Next time you visit Kirksville, take

time to learn more about Still by visiting the Museum of Osteopathic Medicine. The museum is devoted to the practice of osteopathy and to Still, who in 2014 was inducted into the Hall of Famous Missourians at the State Capitol in Jefferson City.



HIGHWAY 36 INNOVATOR PIONEER IN AIR CRAFT



When it comes to innovators, few connected with Missouri's Way of American Genius, are as prolific as William "Bill" Lear.

Born in Hannibal in 1902, Lear is best known as the man who invented the Lear jet, but his first love was radio - and all things related to it.

While living as a teen in Oklahoma, Lear opened a small radio lab in his home. He developed a "B" battery eliminator so radios could run on household electricity.

After World War II, he created the Lear F-5 Autopilot, considered one of the great

inventions in aviation because it allowed pilots to lock onto homing signals and land aircraft in what's called "zero zero" weather, meaning clouds are down to the ground and visibility is zero.

After working on different projects for many years, Lear in 1962 put all his effort, and money, into one idea: Developing an aircraft for the individual. By 1963, his dreams were a reality. Sales of the Lear Jet topped \$52 million in the first year.

Lear also is credited with creating the eight-track stereo and cartridge system, a multibillion dollar industry in the late 1970s.

Great minds, a great innovation and an abundance of small-town charm are part of your travels through the Central Region of the Way of American Genius.

Start by exploring Marceline, the childhood home of Walt Disney. Although Disney lived in Marceline only a few years, the city was very special to him.

Even when he achieved a level of fame few people can imagine, Disney retained ties to this small Missouri town, which commemorates his life and work at the Walt Disney Hometown Museum. Marceline feels as strongly about Disney as he felt about it, and you find his name attached to the local



post office, a municipal swimming pool

and an elementary school.

Inside the Walt Disney Hometown Museum – which features an impressive collection of Disney family effects – you get a sense of the bond shared between

Although Marceline is home to perhaps the region's best-known genius, there are many places for you to connect with regional history along Highway 36.

In Brookfield, a short drive west of Marceline, visit the Tillman House Museum, a great repository of local history and beautiful antiques. While

> there, learn more about some of the area's noted residents, including Dr. Howard A. Rusk, the father of rehabilitative medicine.

> > If you're traveling Highway

36 in the late summer, there's more than foliage to watch for. Every Labor Day weekend, Brookfield hosts the Great Pershing Balloon Derby, the longest running balloon derby in the nation. The event celebrates Gen. John J. Pershing's ties to the area and his status as one of the world's greatest military leaders.

Read about Pershing's life when you stop at the Pershing Boyhood Home State Historic Site in Laclede. Details about his career make this a must-see destination for those interested in American and military history. The home is close to Pershing State Park, where activities include picnicking and camping. Also nearby is Locust Creek Covered Bridge State Historic Site. The bridge was built in 1868 and was part of Route 8, which was replaced by U.S. Highway 36. At 151 feet, it's the longest of Missouri's four remaining covered bridges.

Along the Highway 36 corridor, other great opportunities to explore the area's history and heritage abound.

My best memories are the years I spent in Marceline. Your children are lucky to live here.

after the Marceline that Walt knew as a child. And anyone with a sweet tooth who has been to Disneyland knows the best place to buy treats is Marceline's Confectionary.

When he arrived by train from Chicago in 1906, young Walt Disney couldn't have imagined the profound impact living in Marceline would have on his life.

But the small Missouri Highway 36 community left an indelible mark on Disney, even though he lived there a few short years.

Disney enjoyed life on his family's farm and even incorporated its workings into his first "show business" production: He put baby clothes on baby animals that inhabited the barn and encouraged his contemporaries to come see them at "Walt's Circus."

He spent many hours under a large cottonwood tree just daydreaming; today, that tree is known as Walt's "Dreaming Tree," and is listed on the

Trees.

million during World War I.





You said "sliced bread" right?
Of course you did. Sliced bread
is the innovation against which all
inventions since have been compared.
That much, you know. What you may
not know is sliced bread first was
served in Chillicothe.

In the summer of 1928, a bakery in Chillicothe was on the verge of bankruptcy. Desperate to save the store, owner Frank Bench reached out to Iowa inventor Otto Rohwedder, who had developed a bread-slicing machine.

On July 7, 1928, Bench's Chillicothe Baking Company put the first loaves of sliced bread on the shelves of area grocery stores. The rest is baking history.

Today, a tour of Chillicothe includes a collection of beautiful murals, one of which celebrates the city's status as "The Home of Sliced Bread," and a stop at the Grand River Museum, where the famous bread slicer is on display.

Sliced bread was first produced by the Chillicothe Baking Company. The same inventors also developed a rack on which to display the bread and a



twist tie closure. One of the first bread slicing machines is currently on display at The Grand River Historical Society

Museum in Chillicothe. This exhibit is on loan from The Smithsonian through the Summer of 2016.

Honoring the Genius of our Highway 36 Military Heroes

For those who have an interest in military history, The Way of American Genius has many stories to share and personalities to discover.

The Way of American Genius has no shortage of generals and military men of genius. The Hwy 36 corridor is the home of the highest ranking official in the history of the US Army. General John J. Pershing spent his pre-military life in the small town of Laclede. The museum and boyhood home there tell his impressive story.

North of Laclede, the town of Trenton honors General Crowder. Enoch Herbert Crowder is best known as the father of the Selective Service Act. During World War I, he served as judge advocate general and provost marshal general. In 1923, he was appointed as the first ambassador to Cuba. Learn more about the life of Crowder by visiting Crowder State Park.

In Moberly, a statue honoring General Omar Bradley stands in Rothwell Park. Bradley was born in Clark, Missouri, on February 12, 1893 and was a highly decorated senior officer of the United States Army who saw distinguished service in North Africa and Western Europe during World War II. Before his military career, he attended Moberly High School and was a star player for the school's baseball team.

General Maxwell Davenport Taylor was a four star of the US Army of the mid-20th century, who served as the fifth Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff after having been appointed by President.

General Sterling Price was a soldier, lawyer, planter, and politician who served as the 11th Governor of Missouri from 1853 to 1857. He also served as a US Army during the Mexican-American War, and a Confederate Army major general in the American Civil War. There is a statue and a museum in Keytsville, just south of Hwy 36.

Three Civil War Battle Sites can be found along the

corridor including The Battle of Kirksville, near Kirksville, The Battle of Athens near Revere and The Battle of Painter Creek, five miles north of New Cambria.

Additionally, Civil War buffs should visit several significant sites along Hwy 36. The Old Baptist Cemetery in Hannibal has a panel commemorating soldiers from the historic 55th Massachusetts Regiments and the 39th Missouri Volunteer Infantry who are buried there. Macon, located on the Mason-Dixon line, was home to 7000 soldiers at one point. St. Agnes Hall was built in 1846 for use as a Union Army Headquarters.



The Blees Mansion is a civil war era building used as a military academy and is now home to a museum. In St. Joseph, Forth Smith Park is named after Colonel Robert F. Smith and was erected in 1861 as a safeguard against conflicting armies battling on either side of

the state line.

Highway 36 itself is a tribute to the service of our military men and women; it has been named as the VFW Memorial Highway to honor our veterans for their faithful service to our country.

HIGHWAY 36 INNOVATION

FATHER OF REHABILITATIVE MEDICINE

Dr. Howard A. Rusk



You could argue that Dr. Howard A. Rusk, a Brookfield native and perhaps one of the more overlooked innovators along Missouri Highway 36, actually was among the first to acknowledge the region's strong historic connections.

It was in his 1972 autobiography that he wrote his hometown was "halfway between the worlds of Mark Twain and Jesse James." He surely couldn't have imagined that, 43 years later, he'd be sharing print space with those well-known figures in a travelogue.

Known as the father of rehabilitative medicine, Rusk's work was guided by his desire to help injured and disabled people – who often were overlooked by the medical community – to lead full lives, regardless of physical limitations. Rusk believed that a

Rusk believed that a person did not "need physical wholeness to be the best at a particular occupation, whether it be lawyer, doctor, elevator operator, teacher, researcher, potato peeler or even President of the United States."


During his career, Rusk helped thousands of individuals achieve a better quality of life through his approach to rehabilitation and his work to change attitudes within the medical community toward working with the physically disabled.

As a result, amputees, paraplegics, stroke victims, and others afflicted by physical challenges found hope in rehabilitative medicine.

Rusk lived his life by the motto with which he ended his aforementioned autobiography: "To believe in rehabilitation is to believe in humanity."

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

Prior to the establishment of the railroad in the late 1850s, the Hannibal to St. Joseph stagecoach route was called the "Hound Dog Trail."


"Missouri's U.S. Highway 36" started out as a parallel route of the Hannibal and St. Joseph Railroad. The end point of this railroad in St. Joseph was the reason St. Joseph was selected for the eastern terminus of the Pony Express. St. Joseph and Hannibal were the second and third largest cities in the State of Missouri during this time, prior to the

American Civil War.


Most roads at the time were little more than improved wagon trails. In fact, many of the major "highways" were actually vestiges of old trails, such as the Oregon Trail or Santa Fe Trail. There were paved roads,

but most were cobblestone and almost all were in major cities.


The formal organization of the Pikes Peak Ocean to Ocean Highway Association was completed in St. Joseph in 1914 by a federation and alliance of state and interstate associations already in existence.

The Lincoln Highway, from New York to San Francisco, was the first official Highway to make it all the way across the United States. The second route to cross the United States was the Pikes Peak Ocean to Ocean Highway, now known as U.S. Highway 36. The route traversed



the country beginning in New York through Philadelphia and ending San Francisco. Calling itself the "Appian Way of America," it measured 3,564 miles in length. "The Appian Way" is a reference to the most famous road of ancient Rome.

Because there were no national or state departments

of transportation highway organizations when many roads were paved, automobile clubs were formed and they developed and promoted their own routes. By 1925, there were more than 250 named highways, each with their own colored signs. These signs were often placed haphazardly, and with no consistency, a fact which created great confusion to the driver of the day.

The United States Highway System, or simply "US" Highways, is a nationwide system of highways that was developed to enable travelers to follow standardized routes across any part of the nation. The development of the US Highway System was the first time in history that a national standard was set for roads and highways. Pikes Peak Ocean to Ocean Highway was designated as US Highway 36 in 1926 and today Missouri's portion of US Highway 36, measures 195 miles between Hannibal and St. Joseph.

Marceline is located just off Route 36 in Linn County. It is the boyhood home of Walt Disney and the model for "Main Street USA" in Disneyland.

The Walt Disney Hometown Museum

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



Cycling across north Missouri

Walt Disney. Mark Twain. Newscaster Walter Cronkite. Retailer JC Penney. WWI General John "Blackjack" Pershing. Outlaw Jesse James. The Pony Express.

These people all have ties and connections to northern Missouri, and this bike route celebrates their contributions and influence, tying together a path taking cyclists among some of the most scenic and rural riding in the Midwest along with cultural experiences and historic sites that explore American history.

The bike route across north Missouri connects Hannibal, situated on the Mississippi River on the east side of the state, with the Missouri River and St. Joseph on the west.

After the Missouri Department of Transportation developed an audio tour for motorists to listen to as they drove the Highway 36 corridor, a bike route along Highway 36 was a natural fit. Bikers, either on short trips or extended tours, can enjoy the terrific riding offered by the quiet roads in the area as they explore the historic sites, state parks and other natural and cultural attractions along the way.

The bike route was developed using Google maps and detailed maps provided by the state highway department (which included vehicle counts and other information). For the most part the route aimed for low-traffic, high scenery state and county roads that paralleled the main four-lane



highway and hit as many of the scenic attractions, historic sites, state parks, and charming little towns as possible along the way.

Once the route was complete on paper, local cyclists and others were asked to give feedback on the suitability of the routes selected.

Then a full-blown test ride was completed to get a firstperson look and to ensure the route followed the roads that were the best options for cyclists. This ride took three days to cover the 260 miles, covering 80-90 miles a day.

The new route has received a lot of attention from regional and national cycling groups, and there is talk about its eventual inclusion in the U.S. Bike Route System, a national network of existing bike routes.

HIGHWAY 36 INNOVATION BREAKING NEW GROUND IN AGRICULTURE



Innovators in every industry have had a lasting impact on our lives, but perhaps none as important as the progress that is made in modern farming and food production.

Many people know Jerry Litton as an influential United States Congressman who's bright political future was cut short by a tragic plane crash in 1976. However his contributions in the field of agricultural were equally impressive. The Litton Ranch in Chillicothe became known world-wide as for a new crossbred Charolais Cattle which set the standard for production and quality.

On August 3, 1976, a tragic airplane accident took the life of Congressman Jerry Litton, United States Representative from Missouri's Sixth District.

Also killed were Jerry's wife Sharon, their two children Linda and Scott; Jerry's good friend and pilot Paul Rupp, Jr. and the pilot's son, Paul Rupp III.

The accident put a premature end to the brilliant career of a young Missouri farm boy who rose to prominence as a public speaker for the Future Farmers of America, became a nationally known breeder of Charolais cattle, and fulfilled a lifelong dream of becoming a United States Congressman by the age of 35.

He died on the night he won a hotly contested primary race for the U.S. Senate seat vacated by retiring Senator Stuart Symington. Jerry was 39 years old.

Litton and his family made lasting contributions which impacted modern farming and food production; a true innovator from the soil around Chillicothe and Highway 36.



WEST 36

Your journey on Highway 36 in Missouri is nearing its end, but the adventure is far from over. This area of the Show-Me State combines incredible history with beautiful outdoor settings and an ongoing spirit of innovation, a fitting conclusion to your trip across the Way of American Genius.

One of the names often associated with the western region of Highway 36 is James Cash Penney. A lot of folks just called him J.C. and he once operated a chain of retail stores across the country.

Penney was a native of Hamilton, where the J.C. Penney Library and Museum today stands in his honor. Artifacts and memorabilia at the museum give you an inside look at the man who, from humble beginnings, created a retail empire. While you're in Hamilton,

check out Penney's boyhood home, which is just a stone's throw from the library and museum.

Another landmark in Hamilton that's not to be missed is the Missouri Star Quilt Company, part of the Highway 36 Quilt Trail (you can read more about the trail in another section of this guide).

This once-small operation has built a huge

following, thanks to a series of wildly successful online video demonstrations. It's become the largest employer in Caldwell County. In 2015, Missouri Star was named the top small business of the year by the U.S. Small Business

Administration in a ceremony at the White House. At Missouri Star, you can shop for quilting supplies and maybe learn a thing or two for your next project.

When it comes to outdoor adventure in the western region of Highway 36, your options are wide open. Watkins Woolen Mill State Park and Historic Site in Lawson offers fishing, boating, swimming, camping and hiking, while Mozingo Lake Recreation Area in Maryville has campgrounds, cabins and a golf course. In Mound City, migratory

birds flock by the thousands to Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge. At Big Lake State Park, near Craig, enjoy activities such as fishing, kayaking or even jet skiing on the state's largest oxbow lake.



St. Joseph is your final stop on Missouri Highway 36. But in the early 1860s, it was the starting point for the Pony Express, the legendary mail service that helped get news from the midwest and eastern parts of the U.S. to the West Coast. The Pony Express National Museum tells the story of the service, its founders and the brave riders who made

it all possible.

For a look at one of history's most notable characters, visit the Jesse James Home, where the outlaw was killed by one of his own gang members in 1882. The home is adjacent to the Patee House Museum and a remarkable collection of transportation and communication history – plan to spend at least a couple of hours there.

The Buchanan County Courthouse, a National Register of Historic Places property, is noted for both its design and history. It was there that brothers Robert and Charles Ford were tried for the murder of Jesse James.

The arts are a big part of life in St. Joseph, so don't miss the amazing collections on display at the Albrecht-Kemper Museum of Art, home to some 3,000 works, many dating to the 18th century. The Museum is celebrating its

50th anniversary in 2016. If art is your thing, check out the St. Joseph Allied Arts Council, which has an impressive membership list of local artists and organizes the wildly popular Trails West! festival each year.





household name; after all, he was returning home to open his 500th store! It sat in the exact spot where he worked that first retail job.

Penney was a retail innovator in that he is considered the first businessman to refer to employees as "associates." Also, he was instrumental in starting business practices involving profit sharing and employee

ownership.

Although most of his adult life was spent outside of Missouri, Penney's place in Show-Me State history is secure. He is among those prominent citizens enshrined in the Hall of Famous Missourians inside the Capitol in Jefferson City. Learn more about the retail giant at the J.C. Penney Library and Museum in Hamilton.

J.C. Penney trained a young Sam Walton (yes, that Sam Walton of Walmart fame) on the ins and outs of the world of retail. That's pretty much all that needs to be said to establish Penney's place among the geniuses along Missouri Highway 36. But there's more to his story.

Born and raised in Hamilton, one of Penney's first retail jobs was at a local dry-goods store. But the young man sought more wealth – and a climate better suited to his health. So, at age 21, Penney struck out for the west.

When he returned to Hamilton some 30 years later, Penney was a

In 1860, the United States was a country on the move – to the west – but it stood on the brink of Civil War. Communicating with the developing territories, particularly those west of the Rocky Mountains, was difficult, and it often took anywhere from 20 to 60 days for mail to reach its recipient.


Enter the Central
Overland and California Pikes
Peak Express Company, a government
contractor whose chief focus was getting
military supplies to the west. In an effort
to secure more government contracts,
the company's founders, William
Russell, Alexander Majors and William
Waddell, came up with the idea for a
mail-relay system that would run a little
more than 1,900 miles, from the central
part of the U.S. to the west coast.

Their product was The Pony Express, and the first rider left from Pikes Peak Stables in St. Joseph on April 3, 1860.

The idea of a mail-relay system was revolutionary and designed to deliver correspondence in the fastest manner possible, in this case, 10 days. The Pony Express utilized relay stations to ensure horses didn't tire too quickly and riders didn't spend an unbearable amount of time in the saddle.


The city of Rock Port holds the distinction of being the first community in the United States to be totally powered by wind energy.

As the county seat of Atchison County, which forms the northwestern tip of the state, the 1,300 residents of Rock Port currently use approximately 13 million kilowatts of electricity per year. But now, due to four wind turbines, the city predicts that wind energy will account for 16 million kilowatts each year. The Missouri Joint Municipal Utilities purchases surplus electricity not used by Rock Port for use in other areas.

FIRST FEMALE STATE GOVERNOR

Nellie Tayloe Ross, the first woman to take the oath of office and serve as governor of a state, was born in St. Joseph. Educated in both public and private schools, she settled in Cheyenne, Wyo., after her marriage to William B. Ross.

Upon the death of her husband, who had been elected Governor in 1922, Nellie Ross was nominated for the unexpired term of the governorship.

As governor, she stressed the need for tax relief for farmers and proposed legislation to

require counties, school boards, and the state council to prepare budgets and publish them before levying any taxes.

After being defeated for reelection in 1926, Ross went on to become vice chair of Democratic National Committee, and was appointed President Franklin Roosevelt to two five-year terms as Director of the U.S. Mint. She died in Washington, D.C.





FATHER OF THE TENOR SAXOPHONE



Coleman Hawkins or "Hawk" is the Father of the Tenor Saxophone. Born in St. Joseph, on Nov. 21, 1904, his mother taught him how to play the piano by the age of 5 and he learned the cello at 7.

The spring of 1921 marked Hawkins' first professional gig—playing in the orchestra of the 12th Street Theater in Kansas City.

By the fall of 1939, he had recorded "Body and Soul," which introduced him to a wide American audience. It was a huge success for Hawkins (so

Coleman Randolph Hawkins

much so, in fact, that readers of *DownBeat Magazine* voted Hawkins best tenor saxophonist of the year).

Although most jazz musicians of the generation resisted bebop, the harmonic and rhythmic approach that developed in jazz in the 1940s, Hawkins embraced it. He made what is considered the first bebop record called "Woody 'n' You" with a group of musicians including Dizzy Gillespie, Max Roach and Oscar Pettiford.

His last concert was on April 20, 1969, at the North Park Hotel in Chicago, and he died just a month later from pneumonia.
